PLAYWRIGHT



Mary E. Weems, M.A. Ph.D.: Mary Weems' plays and/or excerpts have been published and/or produced since 1997. In 2009, an excerpt of her play *At Last* was part of the Ingenuity Festival. In June 2009, her monologue "Rainwater," part of a full-length play titled *Wearing Rainbows*, was selected for the "Queer Shorts 4" Playfest in Madison, WI. In 2002, her piece *Woman in the Tree* was part of the University of Louisville's Juneteenth Festival of New

Works; her play *Another Way to Dance* won a 1998 Cleveland Public Theater Chilcote Award. Weems' play *Move to the Back of the Bus*, a 45-minute overview of the Civil Rights Movement, was produced by Young Audiences from 1998 through 2007. Weems' work *Wearing Rainbows and Numbers* was produced as part of Cleveland Public Theater's Big Box in 2007. In 2015, a collection titled *Blackeyed: Plays and Monologues* was published by Sense Publishing (Now Brill/Sense). Currently, Mary Weems is seeking production possibilities for *Closure*, about the foreclosure crisis, which opened the 2010-11 season at Karamu; *Blink*, a play about diversity on a college campus produced at John Carroll University in 2013, 2014, and 2015; and *MEAT*, which explores the murders of eleven Black women in Cleveland. Weems' short play *Slapped*, which won New York's Downtown Urban Art Festival's (DUAF) Best 'Short' Award in 2021, is currently under licensure with Karamu. In 2015, Weems won the Cleveland Art Prize's "Emerging Artist Award in Literature." For further information, visit www.maryeweems.org.

DIRECTOR



Michael Oatman is the former Playwright-In-Residence at Karamu Theater, the oldest African American theater in the country. He is only the second person to hold this honor in the storied history of Karamu; the first being Langston Hughes. He currently serves as a playwriting mentor at University of Nebraska at Omaha and also is an playwriting/ script analysis instructor at Kent State University. In 2011, he won the CPAC Workforce Fellowship and the Cleveland Art

Prize in 2010 for Best Emerging Artist and the 2010 Lantern Award for Best Play. In 2011, three of his full-length plays were produced: *Breaking the Chains, You Got Nerve* and *Sometime Hope Is Enough*. In 2010, seven of his plays were produced in various venues: *Black Nativity (Adaption), War paint, Eclipse: The War Between Pac and B.I.G., Course of Action, My Africa, A Solitary Voice, Not a Uterus in Sight, Hitler and Gandhi*. He earned an English Degree from Cleveland State University in 2004 and completed his MFA in theater from the Northeastern Ohio Master of Fine Arts consortium in 2008. "For me the beauty of theater is that it lives. It is not an artifact. It wrestles with us and forces us to wrestle with it. Plays live in real time; actors can reach out and touch you. Good drama is not a spectator sport. It's a subtle give and take, a delicate dance between actor and audience; playwright and the world. I have often mused that playwrights are the special forces of the creative writing world. They parachute in; give truth and watch as the walls tumble."

CAST



Michelle Broome (Siri) is a multi-skilled artist and performer who made her stage debut in 2019's *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever* at The Shore Cultural Center. She is an accomplished pianist and vocalist, currently serves as director of music for a local ministry, and teaches music to young students. Ms. Broome is also a community organizer and facilitates leadership training workshops for grassroots community leaders.

Chelsea Anderson (Lucky) has been involved in acting and theater for over ten years. She has played in a number of shows at Karamu House. She has been a part of a number of traveling opportunities with her production company CrossRoads Productions, performing in plays in Cleveland, Columbus and Atlanta. She was recently in a short film with DNG inc. Productions called *The Domino Effect* which was a finalist for the Hollywood International Diversity Film Festival

and won best feature screenplay at the Black Columbus International film festival. She is very excited to be a part of this production and hopes to continue to have opportunities to keep acting.



Lynna Metrisin (Elizabeth) has acted in productions at various local theaters including, but not limited to, Cleveland Public Theatre, Talespinners Children's Theatre, Blank Canvas Theatre, French Creek Theatre, Ensemble Theatre, Lorain County Community College Theatre, Charenton Theatre, Clague Playhouse, and Spark Theatre 4 Youth. Lynna also portrays several figures for *Women In History*, including Betty Ford, Jane Addams and Bella Abzug. Lynna

CREATIVE TEAM
